**Subject:** CAO-004-2023 – Clearview Township Strategic Plan Update

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## Recommendation

Be It Resolved that Council of the Township of Clearview hereby:

- 1) Receive report CAO-004-2023 (Clearview Township Strategic Plan Update) dated September 25, 2023; and,
- 2) That Council direct the CAO to work with the Mayor to schedule a Council Workshop to identify Strategic Plan priorities to be recommended for approval at a regular meeting of Council.

## Background

Clearview Council through direction to the CAO, began the process of establishing a new Strategic Plan for the Township. This process began with thirty stakeholder interviews with individuals from all areas of Clearview Township, subsequently Dunbar and Associates held five community engagement focus groups in the late spring early summer throughout various township communities, and initiated a survey, which was available throughout the summer with a deadline for submission being August 30<sup>th</sup>.

Below are some, but not all the issues that have been identified during key stakeholder meetings, community engagement sessions and through the survey. The Township's Strategic Plan Consultant requested that the CAO prepare a summary report on the evolving community feedback.

## Comments and Analysis

### Forging a new path forward during changing times

To begin; I want to thank the many citizens, staff and council for their dedication and time to have a discussion and share opinions about the great community of Clearview Township and the interconnected communities of Stayner, Creemore, Sunnidale, Duntroon, Nottawa, Singhampton, and New Lowell. I also want to thank all our Local Services Clubs, Reaction and Sport clubs, Art & Culture groups, Tourism groups, Small & Medium Size Businesses, and Farmers.

To be blunt, our community needs to focus on “economic resiliency” as *global impacts* become less under our control locally. The National Association of Counties (NACO) describes economic resilience as “*a community’s ability to foresee, adapt to, and leverage changing conditions to their advantage.*”<sup>1</sup> Over the past three years, the world’s economy has shifted and weakened. In the instance of Canada, we share the unique challenges brought on by the high cost of housing, struggling small businesses, changes in climate, aging population, and the lack of workers in the skilled trades. Not one individual or group has gone unaffected by economic and social change. Yet, despite these enormous challenges our citizens continue to press forward. Our volunteer sector has seen a reduction in volunteerism, yet Clearview’s network of volunteers remains steadfast and continue to deliver tremendous goodwill through recreation, arts and culture, and festivals. Environmental groups, service clubs, sports enthusiasts, cyclists, snowmobile, and ATV clubs all thrive and support community initiatives in Clearview’s unique urban and rural communities.

### **Social benefits of volunteerism**

Our younger generation is so capable, and because they are so capable, we must find creative ways to encourage community volunteerism with our youth and young adults. The opportunity to experience fulfillment by helping others in our community is an opportunity for personal growth and leadership development. As a community we need to strongly recognize our volunteers and build on existing recognition initiatives.

Canada has been referred as a “Social Democracy”<sup>2</sup>, albeit Canada is not a socialist form of government, more capitalist, but with a strong social influence. Canada’s form of government is a “*Constitutional Monarchy*”<sup>3</sup>. In essence capitalism with a social net and as such citizens have both rights and obligations. The Township’s objective to provide quality and fair service is paramount, as we share obligations with our community. We appreciate people respecting community policies and bylaws that balance the rights of individuals, various groups, and organizations, but also place an obligation on us all to place our civic duty in a higher light.

### **Environmental stewardship and economics**

The economy and environment are intertwined in a way that impacts the cost of living. In the delivery of minerals & raw materials, farming & food products. These challenges will compel our community to find better ways to balance the increased cost of home

construction, farming, and population growth. Increased population demands will impact farmland as communities build out or build up and consumer housing demands within *free markets* will increase if there is a willing seller and buyer.

Transportation, labour costs, and improved environmental practices with stringent regulations for the extraction of aggregate, minerals, and metals, will experience more pressure brought on by inflation. With the shortage of housing stock, these natural products will continue to be in demand to building homes, building roads, creating batteries for electric cars, power generation, and the fabrication of various infrastructure utilities. However, if municipalities, in lock step with, the neighbouring municipalities, the County, and the Provincial & Federal governments, establish an approach to new building technologies that provide economical living while being friendly to the environment and controlling cost; will likely require a “non-market” approach where municipalities and/or their government partners will become similar to developers, but with strict legislation to build infrastructure and homes at a controlled cost and qualifying process. Illuminating, in part, the free market approach.

The increased number of forest fires in Canada has ruined several small communities resulting in a complete collapse in their local economies. People will need to rebuild their lives, struggling to be where they once were. This raises the question on developing greater preparedness in the face of sudden and extreme weather events.

A balance between the environment and the economy has the potential to create stronger community resiliency; at the local level “Local Economics”<sup>4</sup>.

*“Local economies refer to economic and social systems that are part of a specific community. For example, a typical local economy may have residents who dine at a local independent restaurant. The restaurant employs residents from the community and buys goods and services from other local businesses.”*

### **The community is the local economy.**

This process of having our community work together was the impetus to use the economic development tool referred to as the “Five Capitals”<sup>5</sup> the model that was presented at each of the community engagement meetings which reflected on the interconnectedness of the Five Capitals (Natural, Social, human, manufactured and Financial Capital). The “Five Capital” tool in its simplicity bridges local community economics with people and the environment that leads to resilient management of our community: together. The suggested priorities the council receives from the community will be based on the feedback from community meetings, written submissions, and surveys.

### **Leadership**

In 2022 Clearview Township Council directed the implementation of a new strategic plan and in 2023 council supported the process to engage with our community where

citizens, staff and council together share ideas, identify challenges, and develop priorities that begin the process of local economic resiliency, where social groups work together, young people find gainful employment and an affordable house to live, that is within reasonable distance to their place of work. Sharing the complexities with the community will help citizens understand the challenges our council faces. Together, and by understanding, we can find and establish priorities, roll up our sleeves and get to work.

### **Complexity in finding solutions.**

Early feedback from our community meetings has been tremendous with many suggestions brought forward. Some of the key issues raised, in part, demonstrated concerns associated with climate change, a housing crisis, aging demographics, immigration, migration, high infrastructure costs, and transportation safety. These and other socio-economic dilemmas have been amplified by the increase of sudden weather events, the lack of affordable & attainable housing, and global “geo-political issues”<sup>6</sup>. These dilemmas have been described as “complex wicked problems”<sup>7</sup> that have a common challenge, which is:

*“A wicked problem is a social or cultural problem that’s difficult or impossible to solve because of its complex and interconnected nature. Wicked problems lack clarity in both their aims and solutions and are subject to real-world constraints which hinder risk-free attempts to find a solution.”<sup>8</sup>*

The global impacts will likely remain beyond our direct control, but locally we can begin by understanding the systems and then finding areas that can be improved. “...*complex socio-technical systems, are not isolated. They are intertwined in existing systems— manufacturing systems and economic systems, political, social, and cultural systems, technological and legal systems. And each of those systems is connected...*”<sup>9</sup>

### **Modernization**

The provision of food, shelter and water is becoming increasingly complicated and costly. We live in a developed country, however, sourcing, extracting, delivering, and disposing of clean drinking water within a community is a complexity that seasoned experts struggle with delivering. The complexity of water and wastewater management is a constant balance between supplying clean water and disposing of wastewater.

Recently, Clearview Township has allocated the last water units for infill and approved development units presently under construction. However, going forward, we will need to begin the construction of the Stayner “Well project”<sup>10</sup> which will meet current and future capacity needs for the next several years, but financing new growth is difficult for municipalities our size to shoulder alone. Clearview will need financial support. The *Well Project* solves current short-term water allocation for development, but other methods and sources of water will need to be found for the long term.

Perhaps council could consider a formal (shared municipal) request to the provincial and federal government; that an intergovernmental and developer task force be created to strategically invest in infrastructure to support both non-market and market housing development. For example, consider the benefit of strategic investment from government for non-market housing (with conditions) and partnering with private sector investment for market housing while building the same servicing infrastructure for both non-market and market housing. This arrangement would require sound policy, but, if possible, it could lead to a win/win situation.

Food security was top of mind when the pandemic began. The governments designated essential workers and injected money to stimulate the economy, but there were still deficiencies in the system. “In 2021, at least 15.9% of households, or 5.8 million people across Canada’s provinces were living with insecure or inadequate access to food.”<sup>11</sup>

Strong leadership and shared cooperation will be the cornerstone in tackling complexities, such as adapting to climate change (locally), improving food security (locally), supporting local business and local development, sharing roads that are safe and designed to accommodate shared use, renovating community halls while being mindful of the financial challenges a municipality of our geographical size and population can afford. Therefore, we must make smart decisions based on community needs and financial capability.

A regional lens and partners may lead to cost sharing, infrastructure sharing, and support from our neighboring municipalities, Simcoe County, and the Provincial & federal Government. Finding new ways to put our collective “shoulders to the wheel” has the potential to move important initiatives forward; together, rather than on our own.

The goal, together, is to have people enjoy their community, find a good job, develop bonds with friends, and bridge ideas to build a strong healthy community, while respecting the environment.

## **Township and Citizen obligations**

As part of our strategic plan process, following the feedback from citizen engagement, it is recommended for council to consider creating a “Climate Action Committee” through an approved Terms of Reference that will focus on local and affordable practices that improve local resiliency and develop shared preparedness from sudden climate events.

We will need to work through *competing interests* to a reasonable solution, which in many instances can be achieved while protecting people, land and all its multiple uses. The pressure will force our community to be resilient in a world where global conflicts and global migration impacts are being experienced locally.

The strategic plan consultant report from Dunbar and Associates is the starting point of capturing priorities that reflect on our strengths and weaknesses, but more importantly, opportunities to improve. The priorities will then be unpacked by council in a workshop format which will lead to a recommended priority list for council to approve.

Once the council establishes the final priorities, then Clearview Township administration and staff will develop initiatives with each priority and share our progress, challenges, and results on a regular basis.

## **Council, Council Committees, Citizens, and Staff**

There were many great comments brought forward. It is our intent to implement initiatives that touch on as many points as possible. It is important to reiterate that we must work together to find the best way forward.

# Interview Summary

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## 1. Introduction

Dunbar and Associates conducted 26 interviews with Clearview residents from the various geographic areas in the Township, who could speak to the issues of agriculture, business and industry, volunteerism and public service, education, governance, recreation and sport, tourism, environment, and so on. The intent of the interviews was to hear diverse perspectives and gain a breadth of opinions and ideas, on the issues and challenges regarding the 2017-2022 Clearview Strategic Plan, as well as suggestions and advice for advancing the plan in the future. In addition, the interviews identified key issues or topics to probe further in focus groups.

This summary highlights the key messages from the interviews. It identifies the common themes as well as points of divergence in opinion. Information from the interviews as well as the focus groups and survey are analysed together to make recommendations.

Appendix 1 lists the questions that were used to guide the interviews.

## 2. Key Messages

While the full interview report goes into detail about specific comments of the interview participants, there were some key messages that frequently came up in many, if not all, of the interviews.

1. **A strategic plan needs to be built on a vision and mission statement that describes the future that Clearview is striving toward.** From that comes the priorities (or pillars) followed by concrete action plans that spell out the necessary steps to achieve the priorities. If there is no vision or mission statement, then there is no way to know if the pillars or priorities are valid or justified.

The long-term effect, of the recent tidal wave of residents moving to the area, will be thousands of new citizens seeking municipal services. It is necessary to act now by envisioning the best service model possible and implementing it. “Long term planning requires a vision and mission statement not currently in Clearview.”

It was suggested that a strategic planning workshop, meeting, or retreat for the Council, CAO and staff would be useful in articulating the vision and mission (based on public input); clarifying and solidifying Council, CAO, and Staff buy-in, expectations and responsibilities; identifying the steps or tasks to achieve each priority; and committing to implement the action plans to achieve the priorities.

2. **A strategic plan must include clearly defined and measurable targets, with timelines and assigned staff responsibility, which are frequently reviewed.** Many respondents think that the existing plan lacks “teeth” and the way to fix that is with action plans that include: assigned staff responsibility and priority for each task; the desired objective or target; timelines; measurable outcomes/results (which are quantifiable and have benchmarks) and are reviewed by Department Heads and/or CAO frequently for progress with remedial action taken if required.
  
3. **The strategic plan needs to be forward thinking and anticipate future priorities, even if they are not yet evident in Clearview. Respondents want to see a bigger vision, looking further into the future, and planning for the long term.** As well, the plan should be a “living” document –agile to adapt to changing circumstances that will occur year-to-year, and that means finding creative and new solutions to arising issues.

Residents provided several examples of what long term vision and creative planning might look like, based on future demand and where trends are heading:

- Looking beyond municipal boundaries, to regional, or County partnerships for water infrastructure solutions
- Roundabouts, not stop lights
- Flexible and new ways of thinking about housing –granny flats, build up/onto existing stories, developer requirements to provide 5% affordable/attainable housing units, tiny homes, rent-to-own programs, modular homes, garden suites, dorm/apartment style, container, etc. and partnerships with social services associations and organizations

Respondents identified current and future priorities as:

- affordable housing,
- infrastructure development to support growth (i.e., sewer, water, high speed internet, etc.)
- climate action and the environment,
- mass transportation,
- mental health, and
- building strong relationships/partnerships to address municipal needs (with residents, volunteers, business associations, industry, tourism, private sector, individual wards, recreation committees, County, Province, etc.).

4. **Residents want frequent, transparent information, and two-way communication on strategic plan progress and on Township business in general.** “Give us a clear view,” said one respondent. Another respondent encourages Council and staff to network with all

municipalities in Clearview “to discuss what is working for them and what isn’t. This type of networking also fosters good relationships and helps to identify potential partnerships and shared visions that can benefit all involved.” Other ideas are an internet newsletter sharing news by ward; or an annual summary of completion status of each strategic priority, and targets for the upcoming year. Social media could be put to better us, such as developing apps for marketing and economic activity.

5. **Clearview has both opportunities and challenges, and they should be identified and addressed as part of the strategic plan.** Each strategic priority and target will have its own supports and barriers which need to be identified with plans or processes in place to address them. One such challenge is the unique character of individual communities wanting some flexibility or autonomy within a broader township structure. Another issue is sustainability – how do we plan for growth and additional services, while ensuring the plan is sustainable and does not lead to degradation or subtraction of services.

### 3. Overall Impression of the Clearview Strategic Plan 2017-2022

Almost all interview participants said that their overall impression of the Clearview Strategic Plan, was that it “lacked teeth” and was too general or broad to make any meaningful improvements to life in Clearview. Some described it as “fluffy,” “written from afar,” “window dressing,” “too general with limited direction” and “generic.”

Some felt that it was a good start to a much larger process, and that the five pillars help to focus priorities. However, it is unclear where the evidence is, or how background data was collected, for the choice of the five pillars. Furthermore, there did not seem to be any reference to a formal strategic planning process, that would have included a vision, mission statement, guiding principles – the foundation on which the pillars sit.

Many of the interview participants realize that the past two years have been a struggle due to the Covid pandemic. This has limited public input and stalled progress on the plan. However, the plan is now outdated and many circumstances have changed as a result of post-pandemic life. Key to success will be updating the plan with a bigger vision looking further into the future; providing tangible, achievable steps with measurable goals, objectives and targets; developed with public input; and communicated openly with Clearview citizens.

#### STRENGTHS TO BUILD ON

Interview respondents see the Strategic Plan as a good start to taking a pragmatic look at the future. Some said that it is a necessary tool for managing new demands and adjusting to change

which is bringing new pressures faster than ever before. Respondents see the plan as having great potential if it is re-examined and re-written to include the necessary structure to make it achievable.

The pillars make good sense. They provide focus while being flexible enough to adjust to change. However, it is imperative that the pillars include step-by-step measures for achieving success along with delineation of responsibilities. Identifying short and middle term goals was useful.

Some respondents addressed the plan's scorecard and found that some positive initiatives are underway, mostly in the Recreation and Culture pillar, like 3-3 hockey event, small halls signature event, employing a recreation manager and special events coordinator, downtown improvements, attempts to upgrade tourism, and increased use of social media. Also favourable is how the plan incorporated the importance of connecting Clearview as a whole with the public transit expansion and making Clearview more attractive to a younger generation.

One respondent mentioned that without public input, plans go astray. A strength of this Strategic Planning process is that it demonstrated why public input is critical and going forward there should be many vehicles for public response.

#### WEAKNESSES TO ADDRESS GOING FORWARD

Most of the interview respondents noted that the biggest weakness of the 2017-2022 Strategic Plan is that it lacks structure and effective means of measuring outcomes. It is lacking measurable, quantifiable objectives. It needs a schedule of priorities, benchmarks, timelines, assignment of responsibilities and performance reviews, and a reporting mechanism to the public, that provides more accountability. One suggestion was to have guidelines mandating staff to review their individual areas of expertise and generate a list of priorities for positive outcomes, on which their performance would be reviewed monthly or quarterly. Without these, the plan cannot succeed and very little will be achieved.

Some feel that the 2017-2022 plan is outdated now and believe it is not forward thinking enough. For example, there is no mention of mental health services, outreach services for the homeless, and no clear plan for bringing affordable housing into the Township. This is compounded by the lack of priority setting and structure which would give guidance to staff to implement the plan. As a result, staff and Council end up being reactive and "fighting fires" rather than being proactive and committing to following the strategies and priorities that should be laid out in the plan.

Some feel that another weakness of the plan is the lack of flexibility to recognize and make provisions for meeting the needs of multi-faceted, diverse communities within the Township.

One size does not fit all and the plan should not generalize across all communities, but rather respect and make accommodations for individual or unique circumstances.

The future will bring more pressures and there is a need to drive for open, improved and beneficial relationships with newcomers, long-time residents, and municipal governance. The Strategic Plan should be a “living document” that adjusts and adapts.

#### 4. Tactics, Measurement, and Review

Respondents voiced strong opinion that the Strategic Plan needs tactics that are measurable and frequently reviewed. Tactics, measurement, and review are closely intertwined and evolving: review may lead to adjusting or revising the tactic.

##### TACTICS

Many respondents suggest that a process for agreeing on what the tactics are and which ones should be priorities needs to be in place. It is unclear as to how the 2017-2022 tactics were derived.

Existing tactics are not measurable and need to be much more clearly defined. The current check mark is not adequate to outline the specifics of the task or whether results are good or bad. It would be beneficial to conduct a strategic planning workshop, meeting or retreat with Council, CAO and Staff to develop a vision and mission statement, values, objectives or tactics with assigned priority, and action plans (desired outcomes, assigned staff responsibility, steps to achieve, deliverables, timelines) and process for review.

Staff members responsible for the tactic or priority, can identify specific steps to achieve the level of success desired and report on measurable results that were achieved in year 1, year 2, year 3, and so on. During frequent review periods, the CAO can assess progress on each tactic and make necessary adjustments to support staff in achievement of the target.

Progress can then be communicated to the residents, and it will be clear to see which tactics or priorities have been met, and which are still in the works.

##### MEASUREMENT

Many respondents said that the Strategic Plan needs strong measurement and that this goes hand in hand with setting measurable tactics and doing frequent and comprehensive reviews of progress.

Key to successful implementation of the plan is twofold:

1. Delegate responsibility to staff members for completing the required tasks (which have measurable outcomes or targets) according to set timelines, and
2. Task the CAO with driving the Strategic Plan and completing frequent progress reviews, which will result in timely and accurate determination of the status of each outcome or target (i.e target is met; target is on track to be completed; target needs revisions; target not met and what remedial measures need to be taken). In turn, the progress reviews feed directly into yearly budget projections (the budget should be aligned with strategic priorities).

Many of the respondents feel that such a system of accountability will keep initiatives steadily moving forward and problems and issues will be identified quickly and dealt with as they arise, so momentum is not lost and the plan stalled.

Other important criteria for success of the plan are:

- **Priority Setting:** Identify priority targets so resources can be focused. Without priorities, there is no sense of urgency for completion and no focus. Some priorities in one department may be linked to those in another, or be sequential in nature (i.e. one priority has to be accomplished before another is possible).
- **Benchmarks:** Benchmarks go hand-in-hand with setting measurable targets. Benchmarks enable Clearview to continually measure progress and determine whether things are staying constant, improving, or degrading, in relationship to the benchmark. Look within Clearview, to other municipalities, the private sector, the County, the Province to find standards to incorporate and make targets quantifiable.
- **Communication to Public:** A list of specific, measurable targets, in priority sequence, is a transparent method for conveying the completion status of each priority to the public, and for declaring the priority targets for the upcoming year.
- **Amendments:** The Strategic Plan is a “living document” and must adapt to changing circumstances. The CAO should be responsible for amending the plan according to new policies, provincial initiatives, and municipal pressures that may arise. Amendments should not be done for missing a target.

## REVIEW

Again, there was strong agreement that the Strategic Plan and its targets need to be reviewed frequently to ensure real change and success. Without review and subsequent validation, additions, deletions, or other necessary updates, a 5-year plan is outdated after the first year. One respondent said, *“Things change and sometimes due to factors we cannot control. Has our environment changed? What about our residents? We also need to periodically check with our*

*residents to see if things are improving in their eyes. If not, we need to understand why – it could simply be just that we haven’t communicated on the changes well.”*

There were various opinions on how frequently reviews should take place (monthly, quarterly, bi-annually, annually). Some respondents believe that incremental objectives should be evaluated on a monthly or quarterly basis to keep the plan on track and moving forward by quickly identifying problems, making adjustments, taking remedial action, allocating more resources or support to ensure success, and so on.

## 5. Future Opportunities To Include in the Strategic Plan

Some respondents mentioned that these are new and challenging times, much different than they were in 2017 when the former plan was written. Clearview needs to figure out how to go forward, post-pandemic, while protecting and celebrating the parts of our lifestyle we value, and being dynamic enough to embrace change for future generations. One respondent described it as balancing sustainability with a good economic base to support quality of life for residents.

A better future in Clearview would include:

### AFFORDABLE HOUSING

- We are in the midst of a “senior wave” and need to provide affordable housing options for senior assisted living, smaller homes, granny flats, or rental units, and supports for seniors to age in place/at home.
- Affordable housing (smaller homes, rental units, “sweat equity” homes (start small and renovate) is needed for residents with low or fixed incomes, younger adults, and families so they are able to live, work, stay and prosper in Clearview.
- Over the next five years, a “municipal housing acceleration process” needs to be implemented with services and infrastructure in place for new homes. One idea is to require developers to provide 5% of new units as affordable to build and maintain, selectively placed throughout housing developments.
- The current tax assessment system favours building larger homes and does not support or provide incentive to the Township to approve developments that build affordable, smaller homes.
- Mass transportation (including trail systems) goes hand-in-hand with housing and environmental initiatives to make the community affordable, livable, accessible, and environmentally sustainable. Affordable housing developments need to be in settlement areas so they are close to highways and public transportation routes.



- Likewise, arts, recreation and cultural services, such as trails, gyms, pools, rinks, parks, cultural centres, and so on, go hand-in-and with housing development.

#### PRIORITIZING CLIMATE ACTION AND THE ENVIRONMENT

Some respondents say that it's time that the Clearview natural environment is seen and protected as an asset, not a barrier to development or progress. The Escarpment, Devil's Glen, scenic terrain, and the rivers are examples of sites to protect that offer recreation opportunities and climate/environmental benefit.

Greenspace is critical to establish in early plans for any development. Clearview has to think long term (vision) and protect it now. And requirements for greenspace should be expandable as the community grows (i.e., a growing population will require more greenspace, not less).

Clearview has prepared a Climate Action Report, outlining steps that need to be implemented. This is not only a local concern, but a world-wide climate crisis that needs immediate attention and action.

#### SUPPORTING AND GROWING OUR CORE INDUSTRY AND BUSINESS

Many respondents identify Clearview's core industry and business as:

- agriculture and its supporting services;
- tourism and the service sector; and
- light industry.

Supports for growing core industry and business might include such things as:

- Zoning amendments to allow for light industrial (C4) on agricultural properties
- Welcoming new small business by being accessible, equitable, and affordable to create and sustain, and reducing bureaucracy to get started.
- Exploring opportunities for green energy, solar and wind power, and environmental-related businesses and services (installers, tax advantage, workshops, products, reputable company list, etc.)
- Providing assistance to farmers to maintain financially successful operations (e.g. workshops, taxation, government relations, 7<sup>th</sup> generation philosophy).
- Supporting farms that make the connection with urban Ontario by producing and marketing their crops and meat products directly to public.
- Advancing the connections and opportunities between tourism and agriculture and understanding what sorts of experiences tourists and visitors want (e.g. open space, fire pits, fresh air, no noise, accommodation).

- Promoting agriculture and historical agricultural culture (e.g. family farms sharing their history and the evolution of farming in Clearview; recognizing the historic barns and providing incentives to restore these facilities as educational and agi-tourism facilities).
- Establishing more B&B's, Air B&B's, hotels, motels in Creemore and area.
- Promoting scenic terrain and the natural habitat offered in our Township, for such activities as hiking, rock climbing, cycling, scenic tours, cross country skiing, snowshoeing, etc.; and consulting B&B and Air B&B operators of the possibilities for marketing and promotion.
- Exploring public private partnerships for recreation, culture and tourism facilities, for example, building a recreation complex on land donated by a company or corporation that would receive naming rights for a term relative to the donation, such as a 10 million dollar donation could be worth 10 years of naming rights.
- Reclaiming downtown Stayner for the public – it should not be a truck route
- Establishing a volunteer/association marketing position for each ward
- Creating an app to promote what Clearview has to offer.

#### BALANCING UNIQUE COMMUNITY IDENTITY WITH BROADER TOWNSHIP IDENTITY

Some respondents suggest that the Strategic Plan should celebrate the distinctive character of individual towns and villages, rather than generalize across the entire Township. One size does not fit all, and the plan should find ways to incorporate flexibility for communities to respond to issues unique to their circumstance.

Interview participants varied in their opinion, with some feeling that Clearview should be “one big, connected community,” rather than individual towns and villages.

Another viewpoint was that political lines could be redrawn, much as they have been for tourism, to benefit from partnerships and relationships under a Southern Georgian Bay amalgamate.

#### PROVIDING SAFE BIKING EXPERIENCES

Many respondents mentioned biking and the need to understand how it fits into the local economy, how it provides recreation for both residents and visitors, and how it can be done safely. Suggestions included promoting safe and signed cycling routes; signage; widening lanes 2' or half meter, both sides of road; provision of off-road biking. Also of concern is car traffic, ATV's, bikes, and farm equipment sharing roads safely.

Clearview needs foresight in planning for cycling, which will only grow in the future, and integrating the plans for cycling into our road systems.

**IMPROVING QUALITY OF VISITOR EXPERIENCE IN MUNICIPAL PARKS, RECREATION AND CULTURE**

As the population grows, and new housing developments are built, there will be expectations for more recreation programs and facilities (e.g. basketball, training and workout gyms, trails, pools, double rinks, etc.). One respondent said that “a significant number of Clearview residents are commuting outside of the township to work and play. Building facilities that encompass many recreational activities will be much more efficient than having numerous smaller venues, and there could be additional opportunities realized by providing recreational services to our neighbours such as Wasaga Beach, Collingwood and the Town of Blue Mountains.”

Another suggestion was to explore public private partnerships for multiuse facilities that could serve residents, visitors, and tourists and could include, for example, such amenities as hotel/conference centre, sports related businesses (sports equipment, sports medicine clinic, etc) ice rinks (hockey, curling, skating, etc.) and a fitness centre with an indoor track.

Consistent signage, park maintenance and operations are needed across the Township to ensure the same basic level of quality in each park.

Another suggestion is to reinstate recreation committees to give input and respond to the objectives pertaining to parks and recreation in the Strategic Plan.

8. Time to dream: What does Clearview look like in 2023?
9. Do you want to participate in a focus group discussion?

# Focus Group Summary

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## 1. Introduction

Dunbar and Associates conducted five focus groups during May and June in various geographic areas of Clearview Township. Community champions and volunteers were invited to attend, along with members of the general public, elected officials, and Clearview staff members.

The purpose of the focus groups was to hear what is on the mind of Clearview citizens and identify some shared priorities for the next 5 -10 years. This represented the first time that the Municipality has conducted in-depth public consultation while developing a strategic planning document. By bringing citizens, staff, and council members together, there is a fuller understanding of what the community wants and the opportunities, as well as obstacles, in planning for the future.

Attendees reviewed the 2017-2022 Strategic Plan and participated in several rounds of discussions about future municipal tactics and priorities guided by focus group moderators. Four key issues were probed: Housing, Transportation, Tactics in the 2017-2022 Strategic Plan, and Future Priorities.

Over 100 people participated and approximate number of attendees at each location are noted in brackets. Focus groups were convened as follows.:

- Stayner Community Centre, Tuesday, May 9th, 6:30 - 8:00 PM (24)
- Brentwood hall, Tuesday, May 16th, 6:30 - 8:00 PM (21)
- Creemore Station on the Green, Tuesday, May 23rd, 6:30 - 8:00 PM (31)
- Duntroon Hall, Tuesday, May 30th, 6:30 - 8:00 PM (12)
- Nottawa Memorial Community Centre, Tuesday, June 6th, 6:30 - 8:00 PM (24)

This summary highlights the key messages from the focus groups. Information from the focus groups, in combination with the completed interviews and community survey, are analysed together to make recommendations.

## 2. Implementing the Strategic Plan: A Starting Point

A strong message coming from the residents through the interviews and focus groups is the need for Clearview to set forward thinking, clearly defined, and measurable priorities (or tactics). Responsibility for achieving each tactic should be assigned to staff, with realistic

timelines and be reviewed frequently so that progress is measured, and any problems can be corrected and supported to keep the plan on track.

As well, residents want progress on the Strategic Plan to be transparent and communicated to the community.

John Ferguson, CAO Clearview Township, gave an overview to the focus groups on how the Municipality will implement the Strategic Plan and achieve its priorities.

### The Five Capitals

While Clearview Township will use various tools and methods for realizing its priorities, it will begin with “The Five Capitals:” Natural, Social, Human, Manufactured, and Financial. Clearview will look at ways to maximize the value of each of the “five capitals,” while considering the impact of its activities on each of the capitals. In this way, decisions can be made that are balanced and sustainable.



### 3. Affordable Housing

Housing was top of mind in all five focus groups. Key messages were consistent across the Township:

- There needs to be more affordable housing now (for young adults and families, for seniors, for residents with low incomes).
- Governments must work together (municipal, provincial, federal and NVCA) to provide needed housing.
- Many various strategies need to be investigated and implemented, such as intensification, financial rewards and incentives, government grants, Habitat for Humanity, tax rebates, first-time buyer program, waive development fees, etc.

Main messages and ideas for accomplishing affordable housing in Clearview are:

#### 1. **A coordinated government approach to improve use of existing land**

Federal, provincial, and municipal governments, including the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority, need to coordinate their efforts. A prime example of how the municipal and provincial governments could work together is creating steps to resolve (e.g. renovate, remove, etc.) empty schools sitting on prime property. Another area to review and coordinate is the role of the municipality and the NVCA which currently has the authority to stop, reduce, or influence land use when little or no danger or effect is imminent.

#### 2. **Building permits and simplifying the permit process by offering more help**

Residents expressed difficulty in navigating the many issues and options relevant to the permit process that are familiar to planning professionals, but extremely complicated and confusing for the average citizen. One suggestion was a “help desk” on the municipal website, presented in simple steps with easy-to-understand language and terminology. Another suggestion is to assign a “navigator” or staff person to help individuals with their grant applications, or explain the inspection process, NVCA regulations, or various options available, and give guidance on how to adjust, change or revise applications. Many frustrations and criticisms come from not understanding the guidelines on setbacks, height restrictions, total square footage allowed, inspection processes, etc.

#### 3. **Increase affordable housing supply in existing settlement areas**

More affordable housing options need to be developed in existing settlement areas. Density levels could be increased to allow 4 or 5 stories (note: new fire equipment would be

necessary.) Additions to existing homes and granny flats should be allowed and encouraged with help in the permit process from the Township (see #2 above). Other ideas are to:

- review legislation to enable small homes, similar to what was done with the “war time” housing program.
- create a community-led group to oversee building, operations, and rent control to protect the segment of the population who cannot get a start in the free market
- Place controls on rent and, if purchased, profit margins on new renters or new owners

#### 4. **Support farmers and protect farmland**

A cornerstone of Clearview is the agricultural community, its farmland, families, and related businesses. Focus groups identified the need to keep farms intact. Farmers also need help in operations and transfer of land to children e.g., possible new severance for family members with no option to sell on open market. Another idea put forward is to upgrade legislation to promote small business opportunities on current farm operations to add a revenue source.

## 4. Transportation

The COVID pandemic created an influx of people moving into the Clearview area to escape living in more densely populated areas, and with its proximity to the Greater Toronto Area, the Georgian Triangle is seeing a spike in tourism and day or weekend visitors. Contributing to road safety issues is the popularity of using GPS systems that route traffic down rural roads that were never meant to safely carry the volume of traffic that they are experiencing now. Some key points about transportation coming out of the focus group discussions were:

### 1. **Road Speed, Volume, and Safety**

The Municipality has seen a tremendous increase in traffic, as both the resident population grows and the number of tourists visiting increases. This has highlighted some major deficiencies:

- Overall speed is dangerous. Roads could be studied to identify traffic flow, volumes, and peak use periods to better plan resource allocation and institute safety measures. This information could be incorporated into a Capital Asset Management Plan which might include such things as community safety zones, electronic speed control signs, rumble strips, big stop signs, more OPP presence, safety zones when caution lights flashing, etc.
- Roundabouts are preferred to traffic lights because they keep traffic flow moving and reduce serious collisions as traffic is moving slower and in one direction.
- Highway 26 through Stayner is too busy, noisy, congested, and dangerous with only one traffic light for safe crossing. Heavy trucks need a by-pass or alternative route and there needs to be a calming streetscape and safe crossing areas.

- County Road 91 requires MTO, quarry owners, and the Municipality to come up with some solutions to better manage volumes, speeds, loads, and safety, including prevention of runaway trucks.

## 2. **Safe Multi-Use of Roads**

Clearview roads host cyclists, ATV's, equestrians, hikers/walkers, who are residents, tourists, and visitors. Rural roads are accommodating a range of recreational uses, long-standing use of farm equipment and slow-moving/wide load vehicles, and now a growing volume of cars traveling through the township on rural roads. This is creating safety hazards as many of the rural roads have no, or little shoulder. To address this growing issue, focus group participants suggested:

- Establishing preferred bike routes and incorporating proper signage, education, use of STRAVA app, etc. Other municipalities have moved in this direction to lessen multi-use conflicts and Clearview could learn from them.
- Working with the County and tourism bodies to advance and promote rail-trails, linkages, and safe recreation corridors.
- Widening shoulders as roads are scheduled for maintenance or resurfacing.

## 3. **Road Maintenance**

Overwhelming growth has created a greater need for more maintenance on previously low traveled roads which are now supporting a much higher volume of traffic. Bridge repair, ditches, grading improvements, shoulder widening, etc. should be incorporated in a 3-5 year maintenance schedule.

## 4. **Mass Transit**

Mass transit goes hand in hand with affordable housing and livable communities. Many suggest improving and establishing linkages within Clearview and between other communities, such as Simcoe County, Collingwood, Barrie, and Wasaga Beach. New Lowell and Duntroon would like to be included with more stops in smaller communities. There may be an opportunity for provincial subsidy or one ticket pricing. A resource mentioned is the *On Demand* study being done in Collingwood.

## 5. Priority Tactics

The 2017-2022 Strategic Plan was discussed with attendees from Brentwood, Creemore, Duntroon and Nottawa.\* Only 19 people of those in attendance had previously seen it, pointing to some shortcomings in communication and public involvement in the previous process.

\*Stayner did not have this discussion as it was the first group to be hosted and as a result, some modifications to format were made for the following groups.

### Ranking Priorities for the Future

Focus group participants were asked to rank the importance of the tactics, in their opinion, from the 2017-2023 Strategic Plan in terms of priority for completion in the next 1-5 years; 5-10 years; or whenever possible, but not critical. The resulting ranking comes from comparing the number of people who felt it was a priority for the next 1-5 years versus those who did not and is in descending order of priority.

This does not mean that tactics lower on the list are unimportant, it means that the most pressing tactics, in the residents' opinion, are listed first. Some of the lower priorities may be done in tandem with higher priorities as resources become available.

- Mixed Housing Stock (e.g., affordable senior housing, live and work in Clearview)
- Facilities for Aging in Place
- Infrastructure Development (e.g., park accessibility, connecting trails, bike trails, bike safety and paved shoulders)
- Small Halls Promotion
- Recreation Programming (e.g., year-round for kids, pickleball, skate and bike parks)
- Recreation Master Plan
- Advocacy Role regarding provincial and federal government
- Agribusiness Cultivation and Incubation
- Enhance Council Engagement
- Promoting Community Theatre and Music
- Tourism Programming (with necessary staffing complement)
- Public Transit Expansion (e.g., connectivity to Wasaga, Collingwood, communities within Clearview, active transportation)
- Community Branding
- Signage and Wayfinding
- Small Business Attraction and Incubation
- Define Council Roles regarding boards, committees
- Marketing/Promotion Director

- Promoting “Connection Communities”
- Downtown Beautification
- Sell It Say It
- Heritage Designation Policy

## 6. Imagine 2035 in Clearview

This roundtable discussion focused on imagining a better future in Clearview and identifying the improvements that residents would like to see in place by 2035. This is the picture of 2035 that participants in the focus groups described:

*“Clearview is a community served by a Council and municipal staff that value integrity, accountability, and transparency above all. Commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusion is a filter to all decision making.”* *Clearview Resident*

### **In 2035, the Municipality of Clearview...**

- **Has connected all Clearview Communities to a trail system, providing recreation opportunities for all its citizens at a very affordable rate.** Bikers and walkers use trails and side-of-road extensions for safe recreation. Clearview supports active transportation, mass transit, and safe trail and road use with planned priorities and implementation schedules. For example, when roads are scheduled to be resurfaced, shoulders are widened.
- **Is building small, affordable homes for residents** and building healthy communities with access to doctors and specialists, childcare, and other support services.
- **Builds and maintains parks across the Township that meet current safety standards and consistent quality standards.** All communities, big or small, have well maintained play equipment and park quality standards are consistent across the Township. More effort is being focussed on horticultural parks, green spaces, special needs and accessibility to parks, and splash pads.
- **Focuses on environmental issues and protecting its natural environment by doing its part, being proactive, and leading the way to decrease climate change.** Clearview has implemented several initiatives, such as:
  - appointing a strong Climate Change Committee which is proactive, takes strong action, and guides change within the Municipality.

- developing criteria for creating more protected, nurtured greenspace for enjoyment in Clearview
  - providing and promoting use of electrical charging stations, water fill-up stations, and discouraging use of plastic bottles
  - being a resource for solar and wind power, climate control, rehabilitation of ponds and water
- **Enjoys a central, multi-purpose facility for sport, recreation, arts, and culture** capable of hosting a multitude of community needs.
- **Values heritage, culture, and tradition** and has completed cultural mapping which identifies significant features, sites, and programs in the Municipality. Cooperation with each other, among the small halls boards, is encouraged so events, ideas, and supports are shared. There are enhanced conditions and “new build” guidelines for new subdivisions so they complement existing heritage sites.
- **Supports, protects, celebrates, and enables new and traditional farming** by:
    - allowing small manufacturing locations on farms (through C-F zoning)
    - preventing urban sprawl by building high density (4-5 stories) in existing communities
    - running rotating farmers’ and makers’ markets across the township
    - having a plan to support those farmers who are interested in agro-tourism
- **Works strategically with other governments and partners to develop necessary community infrastructure.** The municipality is committed to:
    - better internet service for everyone
    - clarify and modify relationship with NVCA to enable building affordable homes
    - work with regional government for roads, water, housing, trails
    - assign a staff person who acts as a resource for people wanting to build, renovate, or upgrade houses. This person helps residents to navigate the building permit process in easy-to-understand language and provides good customer service by giving details and answering questions.
    - make the necessary zoning change so that Clearview can provide a post-secondary training facility by connecting to Georgian College Campus
    - encourage the private sector to build tourist accommodations, thereby creating local jobs and a place for tourists to stay while visiting the community.

## Clearview 2023 Strategic Plan Review Community Survey

September 19, 2023

## Introduction

The Clearview Strategic Plan Review Community Survey (survey) was available online through a link from the Township of Clearview's website or the public could fill out a paper version of the survey at the Clearview Administration Centre. Surveys were collected from May 15th to August 30th, 2023. In total 615 surveys were received. A copy of the survey questionnaire is provided as a separate attachment to this report.

In the survey 17 questions were asked, a set of questions about the person completing the survey, as well as questions about their level of satisfaction with existing municipal services, facilities, and recreational amenities. The second half of the survey asked for their input to set priorities on the future direction, programs, amenities and input specific on key issues as Clearview Township drafts its new strategic plan. The majority of the questions were closed ended questions. Opportunities were provided throughout the questionnaire to add comments and suggestions. All of the comments received are attached as a separate document to this report. In this report open text responses, comments and suggestions, are summarized at a high level helping to add insights and context. The aggregated results from the survey as frequency tables are documented in a separate attachment, while within the report highlights of aggregated results are included to assist Clearview Township as it prepares strategic directions and actions to guide the municipality in the next five years.

## Respondents

Once the raw dataset was reviewed and cleaned the valid number of respondents used for analysis was 546. In the report where the number of respondents differs from 546 it is indicated, otherwise the sample size is 546 individuals.

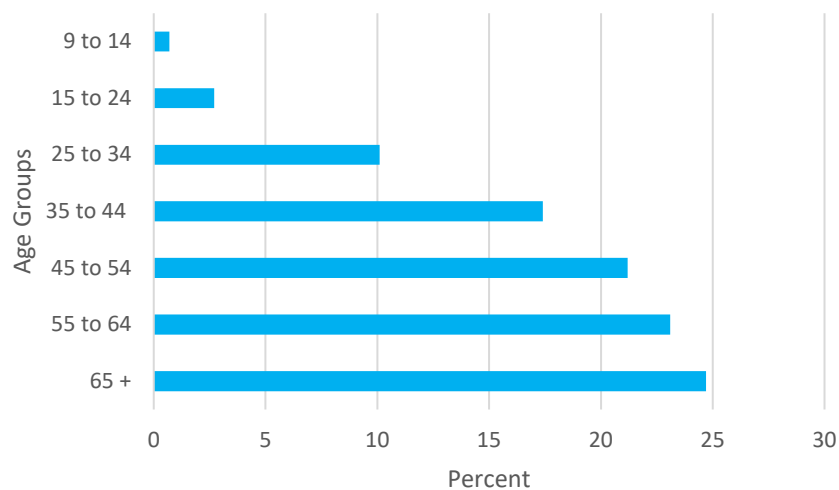
Figure 1 shows Clearview approximately divided into four areas the respondents were asked where they resided and the number of respondents completing the survey indicated in each area. Another 16 respondents indicated they did not reside in Clearview.

Figure 1: Four Areas of Clearview &amp; Where Respondents Reside



The majority of respondents (93 percent) were full-time Clearview residents. An additional 4.4 percent were seasonal residents and the remaining 2.6 percent (14 people) did not reside in the Township. Note that in separate questions the number of individuals reporting they did not live in the municipality was different (*e.g.*, 16 people indicated 'I do not reside in Clearview' to Question 4 vs. 14 people on Question 2). Based on gender, 62 percent of respondents identified as women; 38 percent were men. One respondent identified as non-binary and 2 others preferred not to state their gender. The ages of the people taking the survey is showing in Figure 2.

Figure 2: Age Distribution of Survey Respondents





The most common age group completing the survey, as shown in Figure 2, at about 25 percent of all respondents, were 65 years of age or older. The 55-64 year old and 45-54 year old categories were the next most frequently indicated respondents' ages. In total 69 percent of all respondents were older than 45 years of age.

Finally, the type of residential unit respondents lived in rounded out the demographic characteristics asked of respondents. An option of living in 'Agricultural/Farmhouse' in this question provided an indication of those living in rural areas. To this end, 19 percent indicated they lived in a farmhouse or rural area, with slightly over 80 percent living in a community or settlement area. Of those not living in a farmhouse, 95 percent stated they lived in single detached homes, 2 percent in an apartment, and the remaining 3 percentage, made up of 0.9 percent in each of the following categories, either lived in semi-detached homes, townhouses/rowhouses or condominiums.

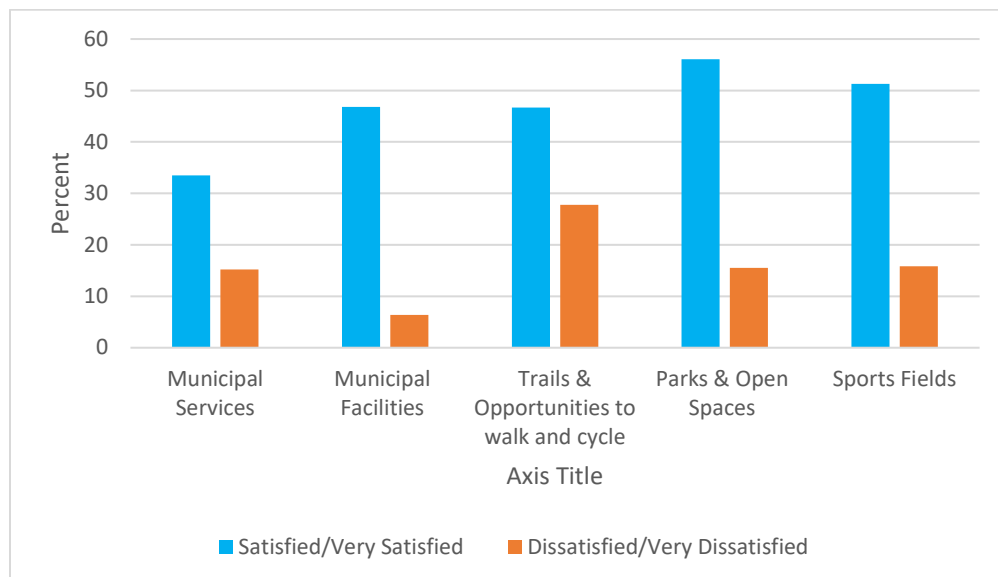
In comparison to the most recent census data from Statistic Canada (2021 Community Profile & 2021 Census of Agriculture – Clearview Township) the individuals completing this survey were older, included more females than males, and were liking to live in single detached homes than what's found in the current census community profile for Clearview Township.

### Current Level of Satisfaction

The next 5 questions in the survey focused on finding out the level of satisfaction survey respondents had towards current municipal services, facilities, trails, parks and open spaces, sports fields as well as the Clearview 2017-2022 Strategic Plan. Figure 3 shows overall level of satisfaction on many of these items.

Sports fields and parks and open spaces received over half of the respondents indicating they were satisfied or very satisfied with what was currently offered in Clearview. They were most dissatisfied with trails and opportunities to walk and cycle (27.8 percent).

Figure 3: Overall Level of Satisfaction



The majority of the municipal services comments received related to road conditions, maintenance, safety or making improvements to active transportation and public transit. Feedback on needing to improve customer service when interacting with Township staff or receiving value on taxes paid were also common themes.

There were 145 comments made on municipal facilities. Many positive comments were related to the library. A major theme was also noted in the comments on very specific wishes for new facilities in various communities (e.g., splash pads, dog park in Creemore, pool in Nottawa, cover ice pad in New Lowell, new parks). A few felt there isn't equal provision of facilities across Clearview communities with New Lowell singled out as not being well provided for. Some of the respondents felt community halls or owned facilities should be prepared to become emergency centers should the Township face extreme weather, or that these should be used as youth drop-in centers; others thought halls should be closed and/or sold. Another segment of these comments indicated they don't use municipal facilities, or they go to other municipalities having the facilities they want to use (e.g., indoor pool, gym, senior's programs).

Close to 200 comments were received on trails, perhaps an indication of the level of satisfaction respondents had about trails. There are good insights, feedback and ideas on ways to improve trails and enhance users' experience in the comments.

Likewise, in the over 100 comments given related to parks, open spaces and sports fields many of the comments were on what individuals liked about existing assets as well as their wishes for new assets in particular communities.

Next, respondents were asked about their satisfaction with the 2017-2022 Clearview Strategic Plan. Although this question asked about satisfaction, respondents could select 'Unaware of the Strategic Plan' and 16.5 percent selected the 'unaware' option. The comments received on the current strategic plan further indicated sentiments of not being familiar with it or being unsatisfied with specific aspects of this plan. A further 44 percent were neither satisfied nor dissatisfied with the current strategic plan. Less than 1 percent were very satisfied; while 4.2 percent were very dissatisfied with the current plan.

#### Future Priorities & Directions

The final set of questions focused on future priorities important to include in the new strategic plan.

Question 11, on setting strategic priorities, was answered by 519 individuals. The results were weighted then ranked as follows from highest importance to least important from the priorities listed:

1. Affordable housing
2. Traffic flow & road safety
3. Climate change action
4. Supports for core business
5. Upgraded parks, playgrounds and maintenance in communities
6. Improve communications between Council and public
7. Trails and beautification
8. Water and sewer capacity for growth
9. Serve growing recreation needs with centralized multi-use and youth center

10. Increase high speed internet
11. Stayner Highway By-pass
12. Improve Mass Transportation
13. Library Strategic Plan

Further, 97 people provided comments on suggested priorities. However, many of the comments related to individual situations, or examples on the listed priorities and no additional ones for consideration. For instance, climate change and severe weather were discussed as important requirements. Several times respondents questioned why the library strategic plan was listed as one of the priorities or why trails and beautification were put together in the listed priorities. Other, new priorities that did emerge were: 1) education, in particular community's high school and elementary schools (6 times); 2) aging in place and senior's housing (4 times); 3) economic growth/development (3 times); 4) emergency services (once); 5) preserving dark sky and wildlife corridors (once); and 6) reducing taxes (once).

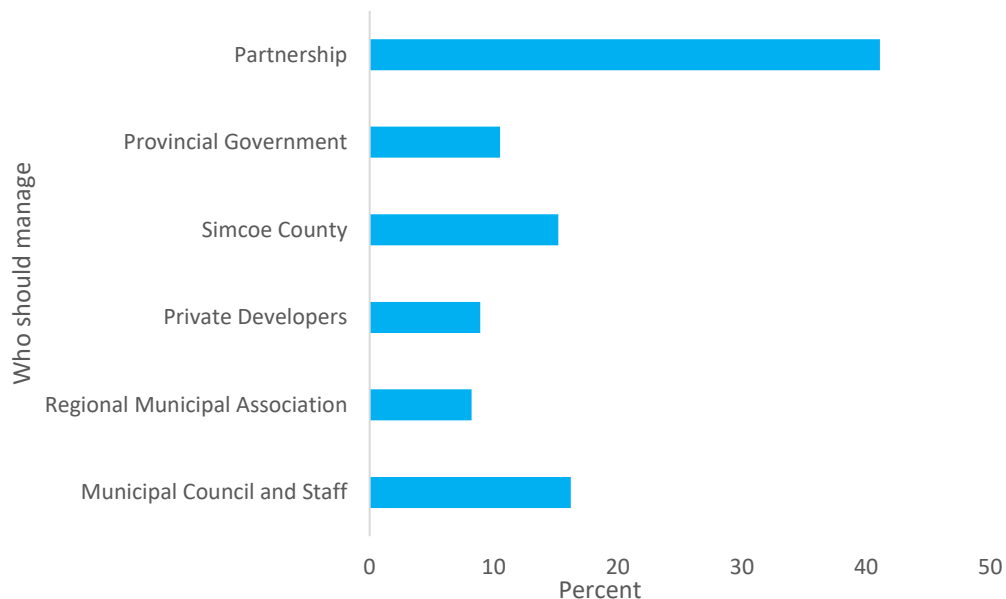
Question 12, on what are the most important programs and amenities for the Municipality to provide, was answered by 505 individuals. Like in the previous question responses were weighted then ranked. The following are the results of the most important programs and amenities listed from highest to lowest importance:

1. Mental health supports
2. Youth at risk supports and programs
3. Programs and supports for small/new business
4. New recreation opportunities
5. Safe communities
6. Environmental programs
7. More green spaces
8. Special events
9. Parks and fields upgrades
10. Electric car charging stations
11. Small hall upgrades
12. Water refill stations
13. Enhancements to community gardens, horticulture, etc.
14. New citizens Welcome supports and programs
15. More ice pads
16. Better trail signage
17. Additional library space

Seventy-six individuals provided comments in the suggestion part of this question. Again what was given provided individual examples, ideas and insights on how the programs and amenities already listed might be operationalized rather than additional items to be added as priorities to programs and amenities.

Specific questions were then asked on the key issues of water capacity, affordable housing and road safety. To each of these questions 491 respondents provided input. On water capacity, as shown in Figure 4, respondents felt resolving urban water capacity in Clearview should be managed by a partnership.

When providing other ideas on managing urban water capacity most of the 45 comments received focused on not leaving the issue in the hands of developers. Five comments indicated private citizens should also be involved and one made note of including the NVCA. Seven comments mentioned needing to do research on how other communities manage water and/or that the individual did not feel they were qualified to answer.

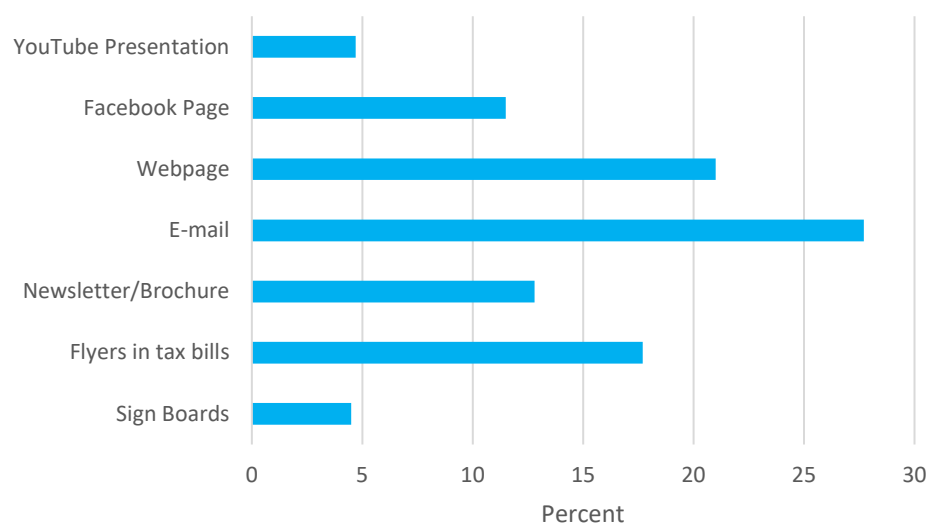
On the key issue of addressing affordable housing in Clearview respondents felt a committee should be appointed (36.8 percent) and zoning changes made (34.4 percent). Affordable housing was not felt to be an issue in 7 percent of the cases. In reviewing over 100 comments provided on other ideas to address affordable housing in Clearview many individuals indicated the issues was not one unique to Clearview. Further, the comments suggested solving affordable housing required a multi-faceted response by all levels of government (e.g., municipal, County of Simcoe, provincial and federal), involving developers and the charitable or not-for-profit sectors. Also, private homeowners should be part of the solution through permitting secondary units, providing incentives to create additional units either within existing homes or through other options, such as tiny homes or granny flats. Focusing on other, underlying needs to address affordability, such as creating sustainable employment opportunities, having alternative transportation for individuals without cars, encouraging aging in place, and protecting farmland from sprawl within Clearview were other caveats.

On road safety an overwhelming majority of respondents (86 percent) felt the Municipality should address this key issue through developing and promoting safe and signing preferred cycling routes and examining ways of integrating multi-user road safety into future road systems and improvement. Only 5 percent indicated road safety was not an issue in Clearview. In the other ideas comment section on this question 131 individuals gave their input. Themes emerging related to conflicts arising between different users of roads – cars, ATVs, heavy trucks, cyclists, pedestrians and farm equipment. Safety was

another theme where comments suggested more policing, improved enforcement of rules of the road, lowering speed limits, effective management of speeding, identifying dangerous intersections/stretches of road then working proactively with County or province to mitigate problems before deadly accidents happen were needed. Finally, improvements made to support active transportation and that the entire Township be inter-connected and covered with such routes emerged. The suggested idea of widening roadways/paving shoulders as part of regular upgrades or maintenance to provide extra space for active transportation and multi-use of roads was made numerous times.

Figure 5 shows results on sharing information and progress updates about the new Clearview Strategic Plan with the public. In the other ideas received it was strongly suggested using multiple approaches to ensure information reaches as many taxpayers as possible. Added methods besides the ones already listed in the closed-ended part of the question included utilizing local media (e.g., Creemore Echo, community newspapers advertising, local radio), preparing annual report card, holding public information meetings, town hall meetings, and updates provided at council. An underlying principle captured when sharing information and updates on the strategic plan is making sure reporting is consistent across channels and cost effective as well as not wasting municipal resources (e.g., taxpayers money or staff time).

The final question allowed individuals to add their thoughts on issues they felt strongly about that were not addressed elsewhere in the survey. With almost 200 submissions made, many provided personal insight, feedback and remarks on areas already covered in the survey. In particular, climate change and environmental concern were common themes expressed. Ideas to support downtown cores and businesses to thrive in Clearview was another popular theme. Sentiments about providing efficient and effective governance was a third theme expressed in the final set of comments received.

Roads need some work (in Stayner) eg. Highway 91 (Main Street W), Montreal Street. Planning needs to address housing needs of all income levels
Improvement to trail network for alternate transportation (walking, cycling, horses etc.) would be appreciated. Also it would be good to see road shoulders properly graded to direct water into ditches rather than tearing out shoulders. Discing of shoulders should be abandoned as this magnifies the erosion problem as well as creates a hazard for pedestrians, runners and bicycles
Building and planning: support for green improvements to one's property and for creative solutions for affordable housing
More climate initiatives would be appreciated despite much respect for all that is being done.
building and planning-Bill 109, 23; no community communication on how this affects everything presently- infrastructure-water/sewer, etc.
Sidewalks are in desperate need of repair east of downtown stayner.
Poor quality of road repairs, cost to build is outrageous, employees took raises, township is overstaffed
Bylaws should be enforced 7 days a week.
Public transit connection, even if infrequent but regularly scheduled, for Duntroon to Stayner would be used by my family. Better mulit-use trail connections between the towns to encourage both active transportation and recreation. Ensuring safe crossing (signage, paint on pavement) when existing trails hit major roads (train trail across 26 and 91). Some of the road work puzzles me. It seems that runoff is typically blocked from reaching the ditches because of buildup created by winter sanding and/or the tilling they now do along the shoulder which creates ruts, thus leading to washouts of the shoulders. I saw some shoulders cleaned of buildup this summer, yet they pushed most or all of it into the ditch rather than removing it, thus contributing to the future task of cleaning out the ditches.
We are very lucky to live in such a lovely area as Clearview, and I appreciate our Township. I do feel however that we should be doing more to bring community together, to listen to each other, and recognize how we can improve. Roads should be for all users, not just cars, by-laws should recognize re-wilding efforts, and water and sewer infrastructure expansion should prioritize infill over subdivisions, nor should these costs be borne by existing taxpayers.

Edgewood Crescent road is in very poor condition. Street lighting is overly intense - could reduce lighting impact on houses and save dollars with environmental benefits. Could use a splash pad in New Lowell for community and all visitors to ball fields etc.
In new Lowell in our subdivision the roads have never been resurfaced in 30 years, some ditches full with weeds from poor grading, overhead light to not meet night sky policies

Clearview has high taxes if you compare communities around us and the services we have. We need to take more advantage of relative taxing to entice future population growth. Developers should own infrastructure development, the water and sewer. We need to watch fire spending, there is a possible cost savings here for sure. Shared fire service with Wasaga/Collingwood could show a significant cost savings with major equipment purchases. There's no need to purchase an arial fire truck for Clearview when both Collingwood and Wasaga have this apparatus. Also works spending, there's definitely dollars to be saved on labour. We need to be leaner here. Just watch the end of the day from the dog park, everyone's always out right on time. Review of break times, clean up times to ensure these colleagues are working at least what's required of them. Public transit is certainly making transportation possible to surrounding communities however what are the cost vs balanced spreadsheet working out? The bus drives down my street and is always empty. Most roads are pretty good, more police presence in Clearview along major roadways (26, airport rd, 91, county rds 9/10 and 124 would make the roads safer and reduce emergency service costs

When considering our changing climate change more needs to be done to encourage active transportation. Better sidewalks, bikes lanes and trails should be incorporated into all communities.
We need a stronger trail system that would provide safe routes for people to walk, run, ride a bike( including electric assist) or horse. These trails should not permit ATV's or motorcycles. Our roads are increasingly dangerous for these modes of transportation. Active transportation is a great way to help reduce the load on our strained health care system ... as long as those involved are not being struck by automobiles.
The Stayner-Collingwood rail trail is great, but it is very difficult to access from most of the Township. Efforts to link the Township with safe cycling and hiking routes would be very appreciated! As a casual cyclist, I find the current situation quite dangerous, with most roads 80 kmph and almost no shoulders. Having designated routes with 60kmph and some markings to indicate cycling routes might help. Wider shoulders would definitely help with safety for cyclists, hikers, runners, walkers, and farm equipment operators, and might help with road maintenance.

While the rail trail is a great asset and sidewalks are appreciated in settlement areas, the rural roads (which for Clearview are the majority I would think) are often atrocious in terms of bicycle and pedestrian usage. The 'disking' that happens along the shoulders of paved Clearview roads creates a MAJOR hazard for anyone walking or on a bike, which in both cases are often forced to the shoulder by automobiles and trucks. There is an incredibly unfortunate bad current in our community who seem to think that automobiles own the road and that it is their right to force walkers, runners and cyclists off the pavement. I wish they would realize that roads are for all types of travel - foot, cycle, farm. I don't agree that ATV's should be permitted on our roads unless they are being used as farm vehicles.

But allowing ATVs on roads that are part of the Bruce Trail is quite dangerous and not very conducive to walking.

Would like to see a trail to get from Avening to Creemore without using Airport Rd

Cyclists should be encouraged to use the trails and not the roads.

There needs to be more trails in the southern portion of the township. There has been no movement on the trail from the former Barrie-Collingwood Railway Line.

Safe cycling lanes to and from Stayner/Creemore/Collingwood is needed.

We cycle and sometimes the large trucks and cars are speeding and make us so nervous. Perhaps more public safety for bikes.

Allowing ATV on the shared use trails can be problematic from the hiker's perspective. Allowing ATV on roads encourages recreational ATV use, which I'd hope would be discouraged to reduce unnecessary burning of fossil fuels.

Inconsistent sidewalks.

I'm concerned about the lack of sidewalks on Francis St. E. In Creemore. Once phase one of the new subdivision is complete, school children will likely cross at the Mary St. Francis St. E. Intersection as there is currently a 3 way stop sign there, however, once they cross there are no sidewalks on Francis. This can be a busy road with trucks from Foodland. Parents may choose to drive their children to school as a safer option which will result in increased traffic at an already congested school area during pick up and drop off. A safe walking route with sidewalks is more environmentally friendly, safer and healthier for our children.

Trails are many and beautiful but bike lanes are sorely lacking and pose a threat to life by their absence. Bikes aren't going away (nor should they) and we have to be progressive with this problem.

Dirty with trash, ATV's makes it unsafe for dog walking

An extension of walking and cycling paths may re-direct bicycles away from dangerous roads (river road near Creemore, for instance).

To my understanding there has been a trail identified a few years ago in the Clearview Trail Link Concept Plan that goes from our neighbourhood to 10th concession. This trail was identified in to be done in the next 5 years which is now overdue. Please help us out with this! Biking down Poplar is too dangerous and I would never feel safe to let my kids bike on it how it is now. I would love to be able to bike more places but it's just too dangerous.



Collingwoodlands needs to be connected via trails. Poplar is not bike friendly and someone will get hurt or killed riding there because there are no other options. In 2015 there was a Clearview Trail Link Concept Plan that envisioned a trail from Collingwoodlands to Tenth line, in the 0-5 year time range. That range ended in 2019. In 2019, I asked the Town about connecting a trail and Clearview seemed interested. So much so, they wanted to do a site visit so I could show them the municipal owned land off Forest Path that leads to one parcel of land which would allow a trail to Tenth line, perhaps by way of a revocable license from that property owner. I followed up with the town in 2021, and again in 2023, but have not received the courtesy of a response. Again, something needs to be done before it's too late - a simple trail to Tenth line would be a great solution and only involves negotiating with one property owner.

Grey County paves the shoulders of its roads when repaving to make it safer for both cars and cyclists. Clearview should develop more bike and hiking trails.

The rail trail to Stayner is great for recreational walking and cycling and I see lots of people taking a break from their bike rides in downtown Stayner to shop / snack etc which is great. I would like to use active transport to get from Collingwoodlands to Collingwood or Nottawa as it's better for the climate than driving, healthy for the rider, it reduces traffic, and it's good for mental health. Unfortunately it's just a little too dangerous on the roadways to feel safe, and I wouldn't feel safe letting my children bike along the roadways today. I would love a multi-use trail and/or some safety measures on the existing road network to help keep cyclists safer. Even some 'share the road' signs would be a great place to start.

This could possibly be accomplished with something as small as a car rather than a bus. Whatever it is, it would be great to see it as a zero-emissions vehicle.

Climate change education
More green spaces as long as they are not just lawn - they need to provide habitat for insects, birds and other wild life. Water refill stations could be of value if home water systems are contaminated by flooding events, something that happened recently to some Clearview businesses. Car charging would have been first but kudos to Clearview Council for already moving on that front. Mental health problems as a result of the climate crisis are present and will only get worse as the weather declines - this needs to include education since some people react by digging in their heels and making the problem worth (think smoke spewing diesel pickups with their emissions systems removed).
All of these ideas are welcome, but with limited dollars and a climate crisis, focusing on things which help improve quality of life for residents, like reducing GHG gases and improving air quality through EV-vehicle and active transport (walking, cycling), are wise and may get federal funding. The Township can provide a leadership role in promoting energy efficiency programs, funding, and information.

This can be done through offering tax breaks, fee reductions, or expedited permitting processes for developers who commit to including a certain percentage of affordable units in their developments.
Not sure on legislation
require developers to provide deeply affordable housing in developments. The current defination of affordable housing is 80% of market rent which is not affordable to anyone on a fixed income e.g. ODSP. For every luxury home developers shoud provide an affordable unit including rental for those earning low wages.

Good idea for preferred routes, particularly for bicycles, etc. Not a fan of ATV's being permitted on roads - better if they were electric so no noxious fumes and less noise, but still a problem due to causing erosion problems, conflicting with wildlife and native plants, etc. - permitting them on municipal roads and right of ways only encourages people to obtain them, thus growing the problem. More dedicated trails for human-powered (and electric assist) mobility would be great. Decent road shoulders would also be great for pedestrians and cyclists to have space to get away from car traffic if need be. Wider paved surfaces like in Grey County and elsewhere would enhance safer cycling conditions. Education re. sharing the road between all different manners of transport is paramount. I would be totally fine if all township roads were max 60kmh and we let the county roads be the 80kmh routes (I believe some other municipalities have done this already) - it may help keep gps traffic off of our roads, thus lessening their maintenance, performance standards, costs, hazards, etc.
Road safety is important everywhere. I'm not sure how cycle lanes would help. They sound very expensive.
Designated 'slow traffic' routes would be great, but their speed limit should be reduced to 60 in rural areas ... and enforced! Clearview had poor judgement in encouraging the use of ATV's for recreational use - they do too much damage to the environment via erosion and emissions (but ok if being employed for farm uses). Safe shoulders on roads, ideally paved when the road is paved, would help a lot. Often road shoulders are a major hazard now due to the tilling the township does which creates dangerous ruts, erosion, or simply lack of width for walking, cycling, or to accommodate the substantial width of many pieces of farming equipment. More trails for active transportation please.
Yes, it would be great to see safe and signed preferred cycling routes, particularly that offer full Township coverage, E-W, N-S! This should be standard going forward, as a safer and more inclusive Township. Looking at and following other areas that have managed to improve their roads by increasing shoulder widths and decreasing speeds along certain routes would be a step in the right direction.

First of all, I don't think recreational use of ATV's should be permitted on our roads - they are obnoxious in terms of noise and the damage they can cause to our natural areas, and noxious in terms of spewing co2 laced fumes into an atmosphere which is already over-saturated. So let's skip the ATV's and get to the important items of farm equipment, people on bicycles and pedestrians. Horse power should also be included. Let's call them all slow-moving road uses, and it would be great to see them more nicely accommodated by motorists. Maybe a big part is communication - to make sure that motorists realize that the road needs to be shared with other modes of transportation and that a good degree of civility and courtesy will benefit everyone. It is very important for people to realize that bicycles are used by everyday residents to get around - go shopping, go to work, visit friends, etc.. Electric assist cycles, scooters, etc. are having a major impact around the world in terms of creating emission-free transportation alternatives and Clearview should get on the program of encouraging their use. I like your suggestion of designated routes, but more trails, safe wider (paved?) shoulders, etc. would also be wonderful. Riding (on a bicycle, scooter or horse) or walking many of our existing roads would not be nearly so frightening and dangerous if drivers showed more respect for alternatives to screaming, black-smoke-belching, jacked-up 4x4 trucks, some of who apparently get their kicks by forcing emission-free transportation options off the road!

We need more paths and trails between our towns, eg between Stayner and Creemore, Collingwood
I don't enjoy using my local main street in Stayner because of the heavy traffic. It needs to be a beautiful place for the community and for small businesses to thrive. With so many new houses being built we need better infrastructure to accommodate the volume of newcomers
In terms of building new trails and having to approach landowners for permission, I understand there is a thing called a "Revocable License" where the property owner agrees to try having a trail on a portion of their property, then can fully revoke the trail if they don't like having it at any time. The township insures it under their commercial liability instead of the property owner. This could be an option for approaching landowners for building new trails.
Clearview needs to affirm what it is and wants to be. It can't be everything. Given our location close to Collingwood and Wasaga it makes sense that we are a rural recreational area with businesses that contribute to this economy in keeping with a rural area of great beauty. Heavy industry and factory farming should be limited while farm tourism and secondary processing on the farm of on-farm produce supported - provided it is not mass market but local eg millers milk. artisanal cheese etc.
This Strategic Plan must have a clear and heavy focus on climate change - how can we reduce our emissions as quickly as possible - as individuals, as a municipality and as businesses including farming - while also adapting - preparing our homes, farms and community infrastructure for the worsening weather that is already here and will be coming with climate change. The low-hanging fruit for transportation emissions (which is substantial) is making things safe for people to choose their bikes over the car.

It is time to acknowledge that the Township of Clearview is more than the Town of Stayner and the Village of Creemore and all should be treated equally.

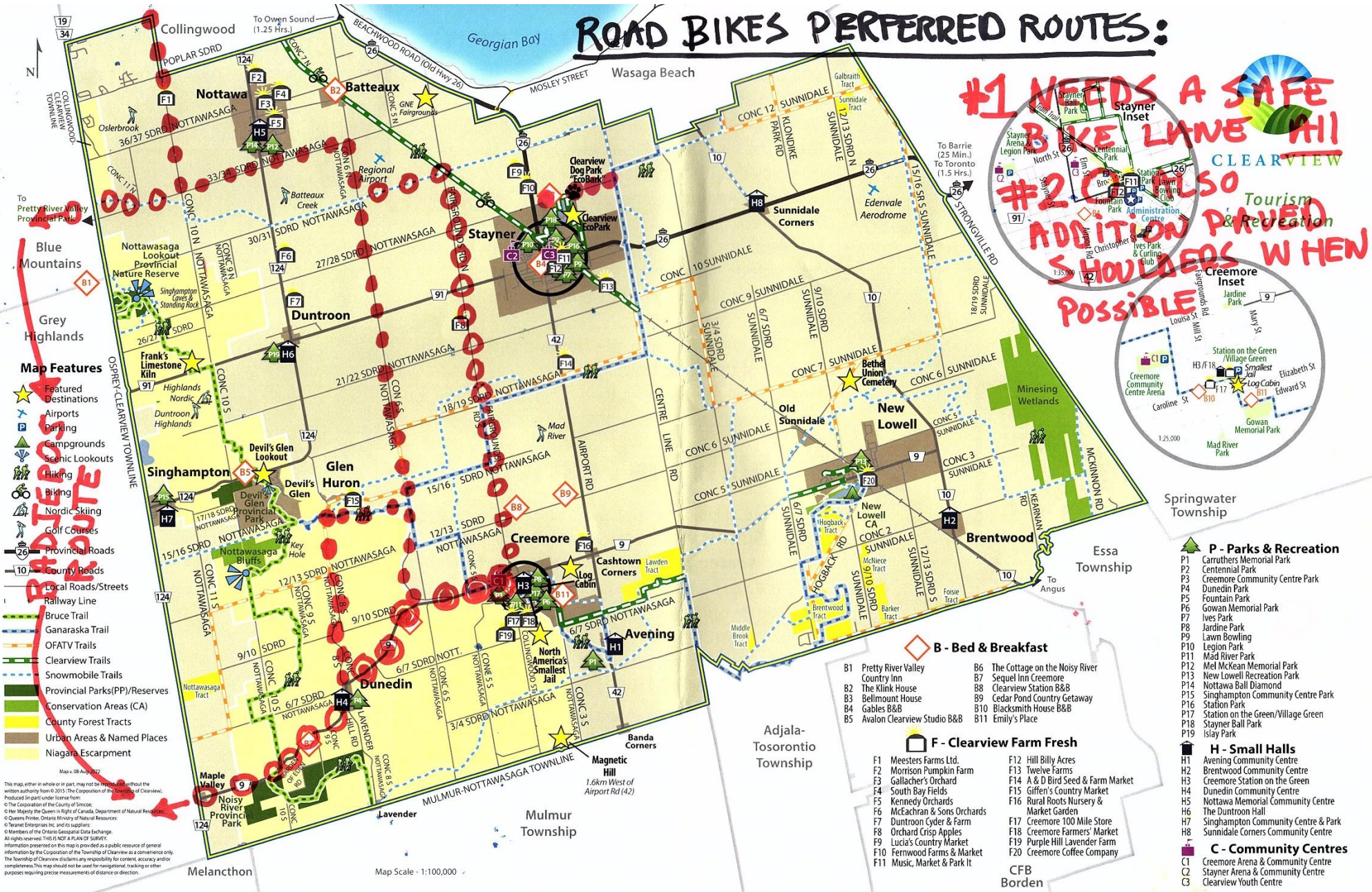

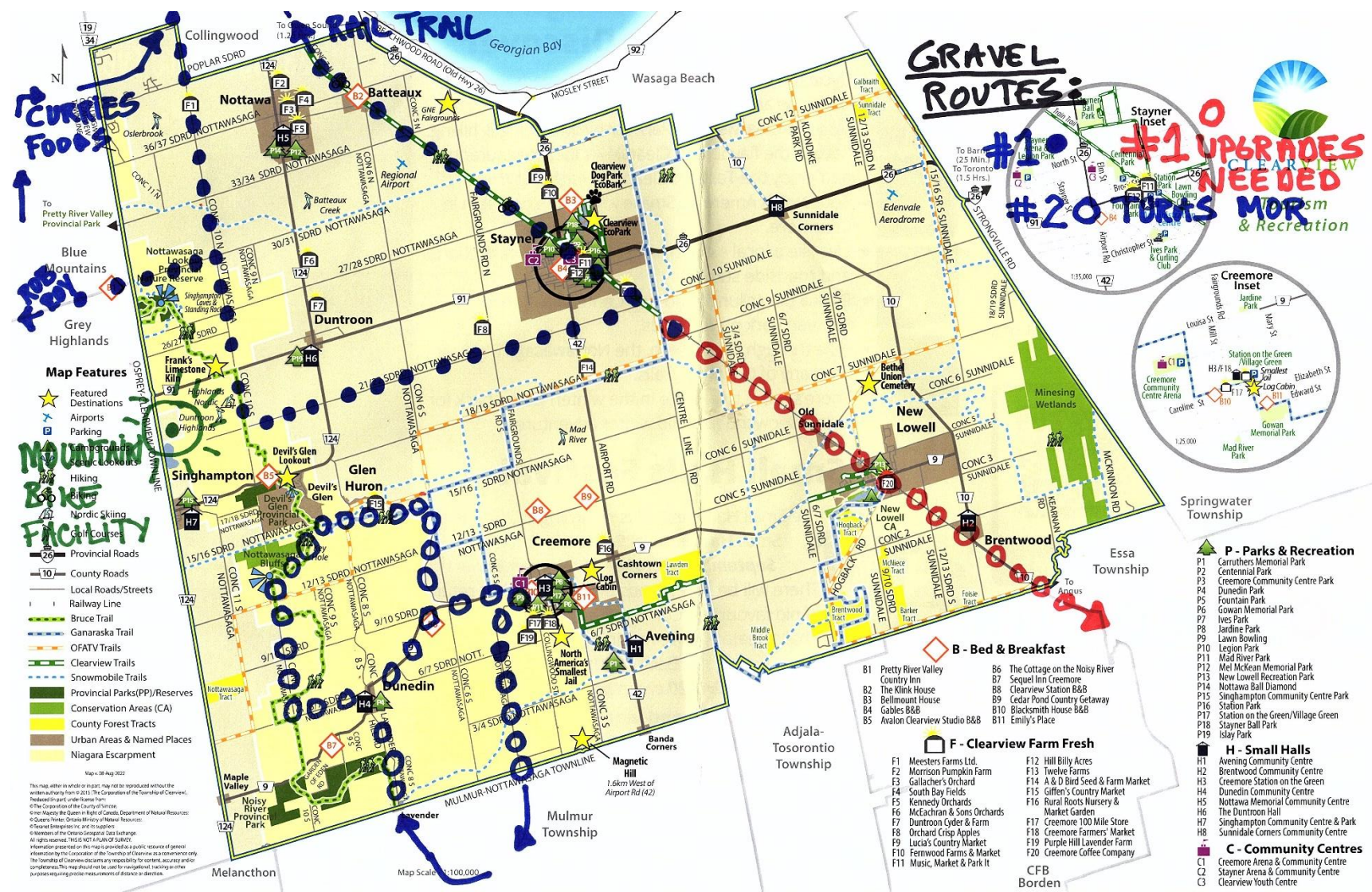

## 2. Garden Suites SDU – Draft Plan for Collingwood

Thomas Vincent

Updated May 15, 2023

This draft outline reviews the steps to create a Garden Suite Attainable housing program to create new and reasonably priced independent rental accommodation for Collingwood. This is an opportunity to create a unique housing concept and a prototype for other municipalities in the region.

**Objective:** To create additional SDU rental units in the form of independent Garden Suites. Plus streamline the approval process with the Town of Collingwood. This promotion will ascertain the interest of Residents in Collingwood to participate in creating much needed rental housing in our area.

**Plan:**

- a. Provide 4 SDU Garden Suite plans, with specific square footages, to be pre-approved by the Town, subject to available land lots, lot coverage and setbacks.
- b. Provide approximate costings for pre-designed modular Garden Suites, including required planning, site preparation, service connections, installation and ongoing management of the rental Garden Suite.
- c. Marketing materials will be provided by Global Hospitality Inc and Attimo Homes for the Garden Suite Rental program.
- d. The Town of Collingwood would distribute/mail out this program to all residents of Collingwood, to solicit interest. The communication would describe the rental concept, include photographs of sample Garden Suite units, and a simple information application would be attached for residents interested in the concept. A step-by-step process would outline how to apply for the program in advance.
- e. Should an Owner have a suitable sized lot to install a Garden Suite, they would sign an Agreement with the Management Company to lease the required land and install the Garden Suite of their choice. The land would be leased for \$1 to the Management company for the build and installation.
- f. Various financing options would be offered by the Management company for the Garden Suite build, such as
  - i. A CHIP Reverse Mortgage can be arranged with the Home Equity Bank, by the Management Company, so the Owner could pay for the Garden Suite without placing any monies down and no monthly payments.
  - ii. Traditional bank/mortgage financing could be arranged through the Management company for the Owner.
  - iii. The Owner may purchase the Garden Suite outright and list the unit with the Management company The Owner could pay for the Garden Suite in full, take complete ownership of the Garden Suite, and manage the rental unit on their own.
- g. If the Owner places the SDU with the Management Company, then the Owner would receive a percentage of the monthly rent, depending on their purchase formula.

**The Management company would:**

- a. Contract with the Owner re the costs and installation of the Garden Suite.
- b. Provide planning rationale to the Town for the approval of the Garden Suite installation.
- c. Provide, cost and manage the services connection for the Garden Suite.
- d. Provide the site preparation for the Garden Suite installation.
- e. Sign relevant contracts with the appropriate modular Garden Suite manufacturer.
- f. Complete the Garden Suite installation for the Owner.

- g. Market and promote the rental of the Garden Suite.
- h. Provide rental documentation for the Garden Suite, have renters vetted and sign up.
- i. Collect the rents and distribute funds to the Owner on a monthly basis.
- j. Provide ongoing management services for the rental of the Garden Suite.

**The Owner would:**

- a. Provide the appropriate land for the Garden Suite.
- b. Sign appropriate agreement with the Management company.
- c. Be obligated to keep the SDU Garden Suite in place for a minimum of 10 years, with a one year notice if the Owner wished to remove the Garden Suite. There would be and discharge fee to the Owner if the Garden Suite was removed early or the Owner could buy out the Garden Suite if so desired.

**The Town of Collingwood needs to address the following:**

- a. Consider offering a tax credit to each owner who agrees to install a rental Garden Suite.
- b. Freeze future resident tax increases for the duration of time that the Owner has the Garden Suite in a rental program.
- c. By-Law 5.15.1.1. Change the zoning re optional parking for rental units. Some Garden Suites will be installed in locations where the renters do not need or require a car. The Town would sign an agreement with each Owner that no parking would be permitted or allowed with their Garden Suite. If street parking was available, then an Owner could use this as an option for parking, if needed.
- d. Pre-approve four Garden Suites with the following square footages – 320; 480; 640 and 720 Sq. ft.
- e. By-Law 4.40.11. Minimum lot frontage of 15.0m should be changed to a minimum lot frontage of 10.0m. Minimum lot area of 550 sq.m should be reduced.
- f. By-Law 4.40.13. Change wording to indicate that any SDU cannot exceed more than 50% of the existing residence. Minimum gross floor area should be reduced from 375 to 270 sq. ft or as ‘approved by Town Planning’.
- g. By-Law 4.40.18. Requires that the SDU be connected to municipal water and sanitary. Change to ‘except where alternate servicing solutions have been approved by the Town’. If incinerator toilets are used or the SDU servicing is through the existing residence, this should be allowed.
- h. Building permits/fees/applications: Reduced to a modest ‘one fee for the transaction process’. If the Town has pre-approved various sized Garden Suites then the overall approval process/time will be reduced substantially.
- i. Commit to approving any qualified Attainable Housing Garden Suite Application within 30 days.
- j. Town Engineering needs to facilitate “timely” servicing approvals. Standard Town staff review fees will not apply either. Also, a ‘peer’ consultant engagement should not be necessary for a Garden Suite since the Management company will engage Urban Watershed Group – Consulting Engineers, a local and reputable civil engineering firm and affiliated with GREENLAND® Engineering in Collingwood.
- k. Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA): The Garden Suites will be placed on existing residential lots, therefore any approvals from the NVCA will not be necessary. No fees payable to the NVCA. Also, the Town will rely on its new Municipality - wide floodplain mapping (approved by staff and adopted by Council in February 2022) and not out-dated NVCA floodplain mapping limits posted now on the NVCA’s website and in order to avoid “no-build situations” where the NVCA floodplain mapping database no longer applies for use in this program. The Management company’s engineer of record will also be responsible for ensuring floodplain mapping matters are addressed satisfactorily since GREENLAND® prepared the new floodplain mapping and under contact to the Municipality.

- I. Development Charges and Any Town Administrative (incl. legal) Fees: Waived.
- m. Property Taxes: Should be reduced for the Owner if they proceed with a Garden Suite Rental installation. Annual tax increases will be frozen while the Owner had the rental Garden Suite in operation. See A and B above.
- n. Parkland Cash in Lieu: Waived and not charged for Garden Suites.
- o. Letters of Credit: Waived since water and sanitary sewer connection are intended to be connected to existing services within each private property, and not within Municipal Right-of-Way lands.
- p. Density: Not an issue for one off Garden Suites. If any Owner wanted to install more than one suite, this will be covered under Bill 23.  
Town will be responsible, with cooperation from the Management company's engineer-of-record, to confirm the locations of all utilities (water, sanitary, electrical, Bell, Rogers, etc.) at all Garden Suite property frontages. With oversight by the Management company's engineer -of-record, the Management company and Urban Watershed Group – Consulting Engineers will be responsible for all in-field verifications of the same utilities and within the vicinity of the proposed servicing routes / alignments to each new Garden Suite. During the construction of water, sanitary and electrical connections to existing on-site services, the Management company's engineer-of record will provide suitable oversight of a bonded / reputable contractor that will also be retained by the Management company.

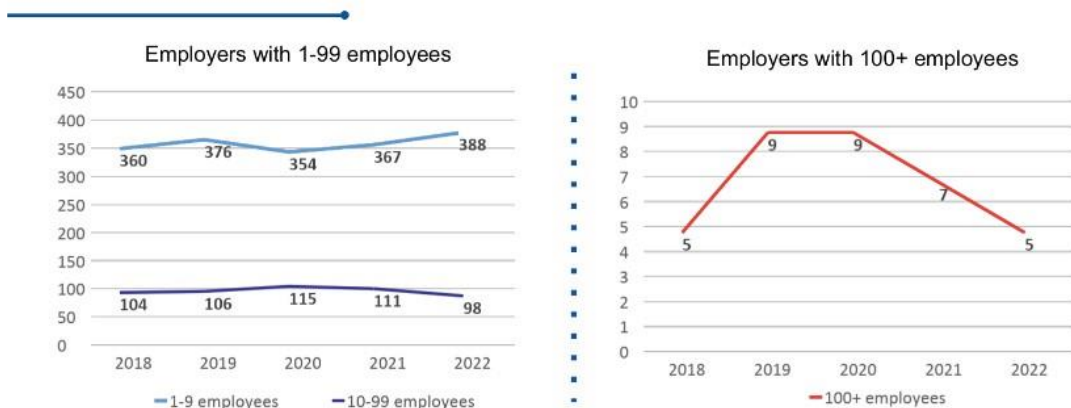

### Executive Summary:

Unprecedented weather events happening throughout our country and the world underline the need to plan for a new climate reality. To ensure Clearview’s urban spaces are resilient in the face of climate change, and the Township’s rural character and special landscapes are preserved and strengthened, let’s seize upon the Strategic Plan Update as an opportunity to formally acknowledge climate considerations as critical factors in all decision-making. A ‘climate lens’ in the Township’s Strategic Plan will ensure “future-ready” procurement and policy decisions, where greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions are minimized (mitigated), and resilience and adaptation to our changing climate maximized. Let’s build on Clearview’s commendable past decisions, notably its early adoption of solar installations, by formally acknowledging the need to include climate considerations in all decision-making.

Key planning and policy priorities identified by Clearview residents involve:

1. **The preservation and support of our vital farming community and our rural landscapes,** through:
  - the protection of farmland and the support of farmers’ efforts to increase the resilience of their operations; and
  - the protection and enhancement of our natural areas and their biodiversity.
2. **The reduction of our carbon emissions at both the corporate and community levels,** through municipal leadership in net-zero building; and
3. **Township outreach and education to the community on the realities of our changing climate and the benefits that result from prudently reducing our emissions,** such as lower corporate and homeowner costs, improved health and quality of life, and a more sustainable and resilient community.

We want to see Clearview go forward as a progressive leader in sustainability, formally embedding climate considerations in all our decisions, collaborating with our regional and government partners, and helping our community work together to reduce our carbon emissions, improve our resilience, and create a better future.

Respecting and honouring Indigenous teachings offers wise counsel for thoughtful Township decisions, such as the Seven Generations thinking to consider the impact of what we do now on future generations. It is also vitally important that the Township take a leadership role, and collaborate with regional and other government levels, in providing our residents with critical, trusted-source information on best practices for moving forward as a community, including ways to improve household efficiencies to reduce costs, improve health outcomes and quality of life, and offer a more sustainable and resilient community to live in.

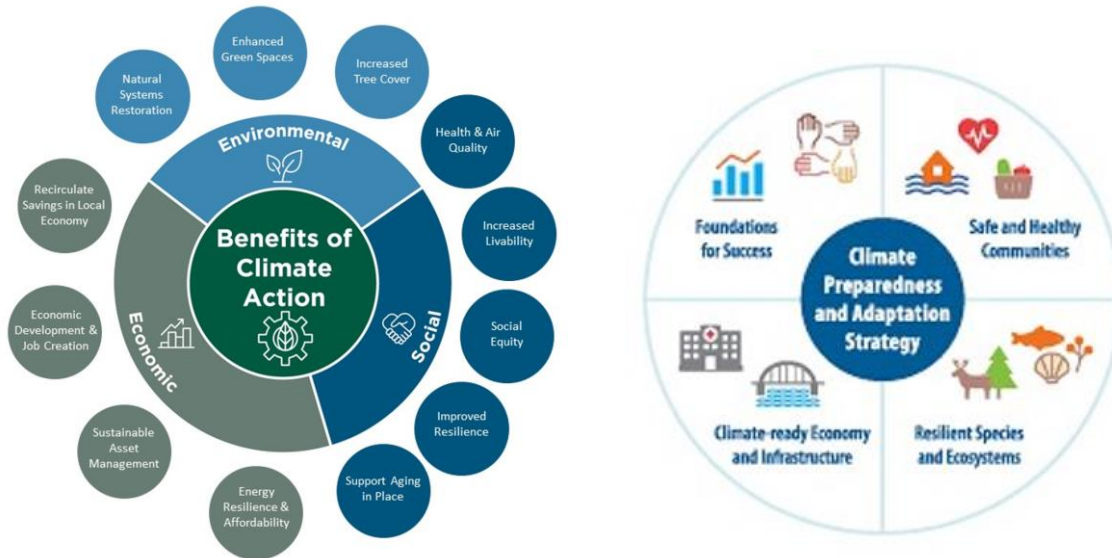
Clearview Township has a good track record of positive efforts to reduce their corporate emissions, including the early adaptation of solar panel installations on Township properties, and the more recent decisions to purchase an electric ice resurfacer and 20 EV charging stations. These are all excellent. Last year's unanimously approved Council decision directed the renewed Strategic Plan to include the use of a climate lens, which would ensure that commendable decisions like these and more continue to be made. Applying a climate lens to procurement and development decisions ensures that the full impact - social, economic and environmental - of Township decisions will be considered, providing an opportunity for sustainability leadership where GHG reduction strategies and climate adaptation measures are maximized. Pursuing renewable energy and energy efficiencies helps build a more resilient future for our residents, while investments in community adaptation and resilience offer a 6 to 1 cost advantage (data from Intact Centre).

## Potential Policies

Some specific examples of policies that Clearview could implement include its efforts:

- **Infrastructure:** create a roadmap to reach net-zero and decarbonize Township operations; ensure building infrastructure is resistant to climate threats e.g. flooding, wind; pursue high performance resilient building standards that improve energy efficiency and focus on renewables; promote fully sustainable (economically, environmentally, and socially) development intensification within existing settlement areas; assist residents in learning about and accessing home retrofit programs to improve energy efficiency and decarbonize
- **Transportation:** promote the transition to low GHG transportation; encourage active and sustainable transportation through improvement to and connectivity between the Township's trail network and the addition of designated safe cycling routes; continued support of public transit options
- **Natural Environments:** protect our natural environments – wetlands, watercourses, forests – and prioritize nature-based solutions; promote and expand tree canopy/planning programs
- **Food and Water Security:** support climate-resiliency initiatives in agricultural and natural systems to enhance food security, support local farmers, and ensure continued access to clean water; work with Clearview's farming community in their efforts towards sustainable agricultural practices
- **Partnerships:** explore planning with other local Councils, health units, and tiers of government to achieve maximum efficiencies in climate mitigation and adaptation efforts
- **Education:** work with Township Council, staff, and concerned community stakeholders to educate our residents, through official channels, on the importance and urgency of implementing climate mitigation and adaptation measures, **to work together to make our community as robust and resilient as possible**, with no one left behind

## Addendum to the Strategic Plan Review Request: Some Initial Community Suggestions and Aspirations

### Potential Mitigation Measures:

- As a member of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' Partners for Climate Protection program, utilise their 5 Milestone Framework to lower GHG emissions at both corporate and community levels, to align with the federal 2050 net-zero target
- Continue to seize opportunities to invest in and develop Renewable Energy systems, e.g.
- Township solar installations,
- Look into development of an Environmental Management Plan (EMP), ISO certification
- Encourage Electrification – heat pumps, EVs, etc. – at the Township/corporate and community level, with the Township:
  - leading by example, e.g. electric Zamboni, new EV charging stations for Township,
  - educating the public on benefits (health and operating costs) through Township website,
  - signage, and possibly newsletter/flyer/etc.,
  - investigating and promoting federal funding programs
- Have the Township as a municipal Green leader, with municipal construction projects requirements for:
  - net-zero ready, low carbon construction
  - EV charging infrastructure rough-ins or built-ins,
  - tree planting, and
  - Fossil Fuel-free, passive house standards that lead by example
- Promote climate smart construction, e.g. Halton Hills (<https://www.haltonhills.ca/en/your-government/Climate%20Change/ToHH%20Green%20Development%20Standards%20v3.pdf>), with green building standards for private developers that:
  - Incentivize future-ready super efficient building envelopes,
  - Have a climate construction smart questionnaire/checklist,
  - Encourage infill housing in existing identified settlement areas, with a focus on encouraging intensification and complete communities,
  - encourage passive house buildings by using calculations based on interior square footage and/or tax/bonus floor area incentives, e.g. Vancouver <https://vancouver.ca/green-vancouver/build-a-passive-house.aspx>
  - focus on encouraging accessible housing with minimal operating costs, e.g. <https://www.cbc.ca/news/science/green-affordable-housing-1.6876487>  
(NB Graham Cubitt, mentioned in the article, is from Clearview)
- Provide Clearview residents with information on ways to improve their homes' energy efficiency and resilience through insulation, weatherproofing, heat pumps, etc., linking with federal energy efficient upgrade programs (e.g. <https://www.cbc.ca/news/business/bakx-heat-pump-hvac-sales-heat-wave-cool-1.6918684>)
- Discourage Plastics - single use plastics ban is a good start
- Promote Local Food – support and promotion of local farmers markets a great initiative
- Encourage Regenerative Farming and sustainable agricultural practices:
  - promote educational opportunities for farmers, recognizing that international markets are moving towards ecologically sustainable practices
  - explore federal incentive programs for regenerative and/or sustainable agriculture crops
- Protect our natural areas using both regulations and incentives to encourage further opportunities for carbon sequestration



- Protect and promote biodiversity, with the goal of 30x30 (conserving 30% of lands by 2030)
- Encourage rewilding/naturalizing efforts and provide education re their benefits:
  - in Township e.g. Stayner EcoPark, with Clearview-branded signage,
  - along Hydro corridors, and
  - private properties, through by-law updates and public education/workshops
  - Township-promoted information on pollinator health, the biodiversity crisis and benefits of native plantings corridors on same, potentially in conjunction with Pollinate Collingwood or other group
- Promote and Foster Community on benefits of Active Transportation:
  - Ensure safe pedestrian environments e.g. continuous sidewalk access in villages,
  - Encourage cycle commuting through creation of safe corridors,
  - Promote and maintain existing rail trails,
  - investigate development of further trails e.g. Ghost Trail,
  - building up on Clearview's 2014 trail link plan (as seen in [https://www.clearview.ca/sites/default/files/docs/building-planning/clearview\\_trail\\_link\\_township\\_2014.pdf](https://www.clearview.ca/sites/default/files/docs/building-planning/clearview_trail_link_township_2014.pdf)) and
  - identifying and designating safe cycling roads, ideally with wider paved shoulders and
  - potentially other safety features, as in Bruce County, PEC, Manitoulin Island
- Strengthen Water Supply and Safety
  - Promote use of efficient water fixtures
  - Investigate partnering with Georgian Bay Forever's microplastics laundry filters program
- Protection and preservation of Wetlands:
  - Ensure Township policies favour wetlands protection,
  - support Friends of the Mad River,
  - support conservation authority work on watershed health protections and monitoring
- Promote Tree Canopy and Planting Initiatives:
  - existing Creemore Tree Committee a great resource – explore expansion Township-wide
  - investigate possibility of accessing 2 Billion Tree planting program/funding

#### Potential Adaptation Measures:

- Ensure municipal infrastructure and new construction follow resilient design best practices
- Strengthen Water Safety from storm water overflow and flood risk through:
  - Future-ready Public Works planning,
  - using natural assets where possible, e.g. cat tails as part of sewage treatment plant planning,
  - Promoting resilient, sustainable agricultural practices,
  - encouraging Rain Garden landscaping in settlement areas, e.g. City of Guelph: <https://guelph.ca/living/house-and-home/lawn-and-garden/sample-garden-designs/rain-gardens/>, and
  - water quality testing and awareness for contaminants
- Encourage and Protect Wetlands as a buffer to help in flood control measures
- Support NVCA efforts to keep floodplain mapping current
- Protect existing farmland and encourage local food security
- Support farmers build resilience into their farming practices through educational workshops etc.
- Encourage native species tree canopy planning, tree diversity, and monitoring
- Investigate future Hall renovations and civic building upgrades for emergency centre capacity (e.g. building to Passive House standard, incorporating flood data, etc.)

## 5. Industry Perspective on Goal Setting and Tracking Results

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There are two models that industry commonly uses together that would be helpful in assisting the municipality in setting its goals and achieving the results it wants.

1. Draw, See, Think
2. PDCA – Plan, Do, Check and Act

Industry implements these models to ensure that:

- customer expectations are met and there is a concrete method of regularly reporting back to the customer about progress
- work is completed efficiently and effectively (i.e. cost effective, less waste, best use of time, etc.)
- there are fewer product or service failures

These are equally important aspects in delivery of municipal programs and services.

### **Draw, See, Think**

This is a high level, big picture, conceptual model to focus in on a goal.

Draw: What is the desired or ideal state worth striving for? *For example, everyone in our community has an affordable, safe place to live.*

See: What is the current situation? Where are the gaps? *For example, residents are moving out of the community, or “couch surfing,” or living on the street because they can’t afford a place to live.*

Think: What actions can we take to close the gap between the ideal and the current situation? *For example, increase the supply of affordable homes in Clearview.*

This becomes the goal that drives the next model – Plan, Do, Check and Act.

### **Plan, Do, Check, and Act**

*Goal #1: Increase the supply of affordable homes in Clearview.*

#### PLAN:

Develop a plan to achieve the goal with clearly defined targets that can be measured. What specific actions are you going to do or what things do you need to put in place to achieve the target and how are you going to measure them? Involve relevant staff in setting targets as they are the ones who will be implementing them.

Every target that is part of your plan has to reflect back to the goal. This prevents having people working at opposing or conflicting objectives.

Benchmarks are useful in helping to set targets. Information about what other industries and municipalities are doing is readily available on the internet and using standards set by other places is common practice, but don't reinvent the wheel; focus on making it better. It's important to look at benchmarks that are realistic – you may under achieve or over achieve, but setting unrealistic targets for your organization is counterproductive.

*Example target for demonstration purposes: Enter negotiation with the Ministry of Education/Simcoe County School Board to convert the former Byng Public School into affordable housing units.*

Note: this is a theoretical example of a target. There would be numerous targets required to solve the affordable housing shortage and achieve Goal #1 above.

Each target has a detailed set of action steps that must be undertaken as part of meeting the target. In this example, there might be steps to: change planning policy to allow the conversion; make fundraising plans to purchase the land or building; form a committee to oversee plans; draft conceptual drawings, and so on.

#### DO:

Assign responsibilities (work instructions) to relevant staff for completing the action steps and reporting progress. Each action step will have a reporting schedule with timelines that are frequent enough to react quickly to barriers or set backs and reallocate resources or provide more support to achieve set targets.

*For example: Achieve “x” (result) by “y” (timeframe) Convene in-person meeting of school board, Ministry of Education, and town officials by November 2024*

*For example: Get approval for zoning change by December 2025.* There would be numerous steps involved in getting approval for the zoning change. Each step would be listed with estimated timeline so it would be easy to see progress and know if the December deadline was going to be met.

#### CHECK:

Monitor, measure, and report on whether or not action steps to achieve the target are being done on time. **Every month, each target has to have some reportables, and if there are no reportables, it's really not a plan that is going to get results.**

#### ACT:

**If action steps are not being accomplished according to plan, it does not mean failure; it means identifying what the problem or barrier is, figuring out what needs to be done to**

**correct it**, and reallocating resources to get back on track. The sooner an issue is identified (e.g. monthly) the sooner it can be corrected. **Downgrading the target is not a solution.**

Reporting of monthly results should go first to Manager, then Department Head, and then CEO/CAO. Only targets that require attention should go up to higher levels. It is expected that targets are being met, so only those that are not being met require the involvement of next level management. Again, this is to support success and take remedial action quickly.

It is helpful to have employees cross audit one another. This is not a “boss” checking up on employees, but a co-worker from another department who reads the plan. Staff should be able to clearly articulate the target and their action steps to other staff members. This ensures a clearly defined target(s) and measurable action steps. Again, this is to support success and make sure targets are achievable, not to point out failures.

Say what you do. (What is the target?)

Do what you say. (How are you meeting that target? What is the action step?)

How is it recorded or verified (What is the measurable? How do you prove it?)
